Rainbow Water Celebrates Seven Decades of Service

Rainbow Water celebrates 70 years of service to the community with transition of leadership, historic detachment vote, and introduction of a new brand. Recent years have been marked by progress for the local water district with improvement to infrastructure, grant awards, and industry accolades.

Since its founding by a group of community members as a special district in December 1953, Rainbow Water has been delivering safe and reliable water to the unincorporated communities of Rainbow, Bonsall, and portions of Fallbrook.

An Agency Founded by the Community

Members of the Rainbow community, including retired United States Coast Guard Reservist and 75-year member of the Rainbow Grange, Bill Hitt, and retired Orange County newspaper publisher, Ben Martin, worked diligently in the 1940s to find alternative water resources in response to the California drought, which severely impacted farmers in the area.

In 1944, the Federal Government authorized the build of the First Aqueduct consisting of Pipeline 1 branch from the San Jacinto tunnel of the Colorado River to the San Vicente Reservoir in San Diego via the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) pipelines designed by the United States Bureau of Reclamation. The San Diego County Water Authority (SDCWA) was formed in 1944 with nine member agencies to deliver reliable water to the surrounding communities. Hitt learned of the formation from the Navy and coordinated efforts with SDCWA to ensure the community of Rainbow would have access to the water pipeline. The Water Authority and Bob Deimer from MWD, notified Martin and other communities of the need to assemble and organize as a water agency to fulfill requirements of building pipeline to connect to service. Thereafter five local water agencies were formed throughout what is now the Rainbow Water service area.

Flood Readiness for the Winter Season

- 3 Immediately evacuate when a notice is sent from San Diego County authorities and mobile alerts.



The U.S. Navy constructed the San Diego Aqueduct, carrying water from the Colorado River to San Diego County. The Pipeline 1 Aqueduct project was completed in 1947 to extend water access across Southern California through Rainbow to San Diego. Thereafter, a small group of community members, including Martin, founded the Rainbow Public Utility District, and after formation, the SDCWA informed Hitt that the community would have access to the imported water supply.

The California Secretary of the State, Frank Jordan, certified the incorporation of the Rainbow Municipal Water District on

December 30, 1953, as a **Municipal Water District** within the boundaries of San Diego County. Rainbow Water was managed by Bill Hollingsworth, and the service area was organized into five divisions: Division 1, portions of Bonsall and San Luis Rey; Division 2, portions of Fallbrook and Bonsall; Division 3, portions of Fallbrook and Vallecitos; Division 4, portion of Vallecitos; and Division 5, portions of Pala and Vallecitos.

- All entries are due to Rainbow Water by April 1, 2024.
