YOU ARE INVITED TO A CRITICAL TOWN HALL MEETING

We are working with Fallbrook Public Utility District to change water suppliers, parting ways with the San Diego County Water Authority and begin purchasing water from the Eastern Municipal Water District. The switch is expected to save Rainbow and FPUD an estimated \$7.6 million a year.

The rising cost of water has long been a hot topic in our community, hitting the agriculture and avocado industry hard. Each year, the Water Authority's cost to our customers has risen by an average of 8%.

This year, SDCWA wants to raise rates by 14%.

Rainbow and FPUD filed applications with the San Diego County Local Agency Formation Commission, or LAFCO, to make the wholesaler switch.
